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HUD-VASH Background

- Five-year plan to eliminate homelessness among Veterans
- VA and HUD established high priority performance goals that measured the impact on Veteran homelessness
- The plan focused on coordinated and collaborative efforts from
 - Community partners
 - Local, state and federal government agencies



HUD-VASH Background

- The nation's largest supported permanent housing initiative:
 - Collaboration between VA and HUD
 - VA provides clinical case management that promotes and maintains recovery and housing stability
 - HUD provides Housing Choice Vouchers

Housing First Model

- Permanent housing with supportive & treatment service to homeless individuals or families,
- No requirements for treatment participation prior to housing
- Priority and focus is on housing



Chronical Homeless Definition

- A chronically Homeless Veteran is defined as:
 - A Veteran who meets the HUD's definition of having a disability who
 - lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter;
 - has been homeless and living in one of these places continuously for at least 12 months;
 - OR on at least 4 separate occasions in the last 3 years, as long as the combined occasions equal at least 12 months and each break in homelessness separating the occasions included at least 7 consecutive nights of not living in one of the aforementioned places.



HUD-VASH Priority Groups

- 1st Homeless persons with a disability with long periods of episodic homelessness and severe service needs.
- 2nd Homeless persons with a disability with severe service needs.
- 3rd Homeless persons with a disability living in places not meant for human habitation, safe havens or emergency shelters, without severe service needs.
- 4th Homeless persons with a disability coming from transitional housing.



HUD-VASH Priority Groups

- 5th Additional VA Populations
 - Women, those with children
 - Operation Enduring Freedom/Operation Iraqi
 Freedom/Operation New Dawn (OEF/OIF/OND)
 - Aging Veterans
 - Veterans with a debilitating clinical condition that does not meet formal disability criteria
 - Veterans with an extensive homeless history that does not meet other criteria above



Case Management Services

- Clinical Case Management Team is responsible for:
 - Determining clinical eligibility and homeless status through acuity scale
 - Identify need for case management services
 - Agreement to participate in HUD-VASH
 - Assisting Veterans who are chronically homeless



Case Management Services

- Clinical multi-disciplinary team
 - Social Worker
 - Peer Specialist
 - Registered Nurse
 - Licensed Practical Nurse
 - Housing Specialist
 - Vocational Rehabilitation Specialist
 - Employment Specialist
 - Recreation Therapist



HUD-VASH Eligibility Expansion

- The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (PL 116-283), included provisions expanding eligibility for HUD-VASH.
- Other Than Honorable (OTH)
 - A bad conduct discharge can result from a general court-martial or a special court-martial.
 - A person with a bad conduct discharge from a general court martial is not a "veteran" as defined in 38 USC § 2002 (b) and is thus ineligible to participate based on that period of service.
 - A person with a bad conduct discharge from a special court-martial is a "veteran" as defined in 38 USC § 2002 (b) and thus is eligible to participate.



HUD-VASH SPECIAL HOUSING TYPES


According to research conducted by the VA National Center on Homelessness, there is growing evidence of an aging trend among homeless Veterans who are at considerable risk of entering the homeless system of care



Special Housing Types

HUD-VASH and GEC programs are exploring options for model development based on existing use HUD Public Housing Authority (PHA) special housing types and existing GEC residential care programs where Veterans can utilize their voucher to cover the cost of housing in the following programs:

- Medical Foster Home
- Home Assisted Living
- Community Residential Care
- Adult Care Homes
